### FOR THE DRIVER

#### When you get pulled over:

- Keep your hands on the steering wheel until otherwise directed, even if the officer is not at your car.
- The officer may shine a flashlight in your car, have a radio and may have flashing lights on their car.

#### When the officer gets to your car:

- Let the police officer know you have a Blue Envelope.
- Answer the police officer's questions.
- Before moving any parts of your body, ask the police officer if it's OK.
- Hand the police officer the Blue Envelope.

### POLICE OFFICER SPECTRUM AWARENESS GUIDE ON BACK FLAP OF ENVELOPE

### FOR THE POLICE OFFICER

Driver may exhibit signs of anxiety because of the bright lights and noises such as your radio.

Driver may display repetitive body movements or fidgeting and may have unusual eye contact.

Speak clearly and use the most simplistic explanation possible; limit unnecessary details.

Allow driver extra time to respond; driver may need more time to formulate a response.

Clearly tell the driver when the stop is over and they can leave.

If the driver becomes upset, consider contacting the person listed on the contact card.
